WELCOME AND INTRODUCTIONS:

INTERNET SAFETY FOR PARENTS

Internet safety for Parents presented by the Office of Arizona Attorney General Mark Brnovich.

- **Social Networking Applications**
 - Facebook, Instagram, Twitter, Snap Chat, Periscope, Vine. Profile
 - public versus private.
 - New applications are created everyday. Ghost apps can look like a harmless app, but when opened it is not what it is.
 - Check your children's phones and computers, when it comes to their safety privacy should not be an obstacle.
- **Cyber-Bullying - The use of technology to intentionally hurt, harm, harass or embarrass another person.**
 - Cyber-bullying is against the law!
 - A good practise is to think about what you a saying before sending something on the internet.
 - Once it is out, there is no deleting it.
 - Arizona Bullying Laws - HB 2368 directs school district governing boards to adopt and enforce procedures that prohibit pupils from harassing, intimidating and bullying other pupils. This includes "hazing"
 - Who can you contact?
 - Teacher
 - School Counselor
 - School Principal
 - Law Enforcement
 - AZ department of Education
 - School Superintendent
- **Harmful Social Media Challenges - If you hear you children talking about a challenge, use Google to find out what it is. Knowing what they are talking about is important.**
 - "Chicken" Challenge for example
 - "Blue Whale" for example
 - What can you do?
 - Discuss cyber-bullying and internet challenges

- Monitor the home computer
 - Know their accounts/passwords
 - Know what apps they are using on their phone.
- Sexting - The act of sending sexually explicit messages and/or photographs, through an electronic device.
 - Sexting is a crime!!
 - Once the picture is out, we can't take it back.
 - New Arizona law makes 'Revenge Porn' a felony ARS 13-1425
- Posting things online could ruin your future. The information kids and teen post online can determine whether they make athletic teams or student organizations, and can be viewed by scholarship committees, colleges and future employers.
- What you can do?
 - Communicate with your child or teen. Help them understand the consequences
- Predators - they're all different, and can seem safe, even to parents. These are ways predators make a connection with our children.
 - Chatrooms. There are tons of chat rooms out there. Predators are very good at convincing your child they are safe and to bring their guard down.
 - Online gaming.
 - Online dating...Cybertipline.com - human trafficking.
 - Fake profile accounts
 - Hacked accounts
 - What you can do?
 - Familiarize yourself with popular apps'
 - Know their accounts
 - Make their privacy settings to private
 - Ask questions
 - Know their phones capabilities
 - Communicate the dangers of talking with strangers online. If you have not met them they are still strangers.
 - Don't let your guard down.
